Singaporeans Ambivalent About MPs Writing Appeal Letters

Veteran MP and Senior Minister of State for Health and Transport Dr Lam Pin Min stirred a public discourse recently when he wrote an appeal letter to the High Court, seeking a lighter sentence for one of his constituents. Some argued that MPs, as law-makers, should not interfere in the enforcement or interpretation of law.

About half of Singaporeans (53%) think that MPs can intercede for their constituents depending on the situation whilst 35% feel that clear lines should be drawn between MPs and the legal system.

A similar proportion (55%) feel that there are situations where it is appropriate for MPs to write petition letters to authorities such as the Police. However, about 3 in 10 (29%) believe that writing letters to law enforcement bodies should be out of bounds for MPs.

Widening Wealth Gap a Singaporean Worry



Over the last two months, Prime Minister Lee
Hsien Loong and Deputy Prime Minister Tharman
Shanmugaratnam have highlighted the dangers of
Singapore's rising income inequality on separate
occasions.

These concerns are shared amongst Singaporeans, with 4 in 5 (81%) worried about the widening income gap. Youths (90%) and young working adults (86%) are more likely to feel anxious about the unequal distribution of income.

About 7 in 10 Singaporeans (69%) feel that income inequality in Singapore has worsened over the past 5 years, with more than 1 in 4 (27%) believing the income gap has gotten "much worse".


Singaporeans are evenly divided on the effectiveness of measures to counter income inequality. Just over half (52%) of Singaporeans think that the current Government policies put in place to address income inequality (such as SkillsFuture, KidSTART and Silver Support etc.) are not effective. Nearly 3 in 5 Singaporeans over the age of 50 find the current measures insufficient and that perhaps raises the question if more attention needs to be given to ageing Singaporeans.





ASEAN Turns 50:Spotlight on Singaporean Perspectives

Coinciding with ASEAN's 50th anniversary, Blackbox conducted a survey across all ten countries in October 2017. The findings revealed how people in Southeast Asia feel about ASEAN, its impact on their lives as well as its future development and progress.

A specific look at Singaporeans show that whilst they are mostly contented with the state of life in their own country (contentment index of 74), they are much more ambivalent about ASEAN.

Although slightly more than 4 in 5 (83%) of Singaporeans have a favourable opinion of the Association, the city-state ranks lowest across all ASEAN countries for having a positive image of ASEAN (59%), engagement with ASEAN news and happenings (71%) and optimism for ASEAN moving forward (70%). Singaporeans are also more likely to criticise ASEAN for achieving very little (24% vs average of 19%) and moving too slowly (23% vs average of 16%).

As Singapore continues to steer ASEAN's chairmanship for the remaining of 2018, it is important to present to Singaporeans a compelling case for ASEAN's rising importance.

About the Results

Each month Blackbox conducts interviews with a representative sample of 1,000 Singaporeans.

Overall government satisfaction fell by two points to 79 in February.

Following improvement across most measures in January, there has been a negative correction across the board in February.

Key areas to fall include civil rights, liberties and free speech (-6), CPF and pensions (-5), cost of living (-4), government accountability (-4) and population management (-4), following the 2018 Budget announcement and the subsequent Parliamentary debates.

Year on year, the only strong improvements for the Government have been in jobs (+8) and salaries/wages (+5).


